

14th JUNE ~ PORTADOWN TRIP



JUNE, Saturday 14th

Portadown is home to quite a few historically significant organs, and reliable sources indicate that our last visit was in the 1950s.

- 10:30 Drumcree Parish 2/17 Abbot & Smith (1907). The church is 0.65 miles along the Drumcree Road, which is on the right 1.25 miles up the A4 Portadown-Dungannon road, after it has left the A3 just after Portadown rail station. If you know the area, then the Garvaghy Road is also a possibility. It is marked **D** on the enclosed map which is worth a thousand words. The Sat Nav co-ordinates are 54°26'24.6'IV & 6°27'33.5'IV.
- 11:45 First Portadown Presbyterian 2/23 Conacher (1909), substantially rebuilt 2003 Wells Kennedy. On the north side of Bridge Street just east of the Bann, and marked **F** on the map. *Sat Nav 54°24'34.5"N& 6°26'14.0"W.*
- 13:00 Lunch at the J. D. Tipler Restaurant, 58 Killycomain Road. Head east on out Bridge Street from the church for exactly 1 mile. At the lights turn right (past the Seagoe Hotel) and continue on this road for 0.4 miles, and at the T go right. The restaurant is on the left after 100 yards and is marked L on the map. Sat Nav 54°25'42.4"N & 6°24'58.3"W.
- 14:30 Thomas St. Methodist 2 manual, 18 stop Robson (c.1800), rebuilt 1860 Conacher, 1985 Wells Kennedy. Head back into town, by retracing your steps, keep on the main road past First Portadown for a further 0.35 miles and turn left up Thomas Street about 100 yards before St Mark's, which you honestly can't miss. Church marked T. Parking may be tricky. There are a few spaces at this church, and a few at St Mark's hall as well. Other possibilities are marked on the map. Sat Nav 54°25'15.8" N& 6°26'34.5" W.
- 15:45 St. Mark's Parish 3 manual, 52 stop Walker (1948), rebuilt 1982 Rushworth & Dreaper. Sat Nav 54°25'19.2"N& 6°26'43.8"W. Church marked M.

Pipeworks presents a diverse and exciting programme for its thirteenth festival. This year's programme includes performances by organ virtuosi from the UK, France, Germany, the USA and Sweden; sees sixteen young,

aspiring organists from Canada, Denmark, Germany, Hungary, Ireland, Norway, Russia, South Korea, the UK and the USA compete to win the Dublin International Organ Competition; features beautifully programmed concerts performed by the RTÉ National Symphony Orchestra and the National Chamber Choir; and presents a silent film with live organ accompaniment.

2008 sees the festival expanding to include recital trips to Dundalk and the beautiful cathedral city of Kilkenny with associated recitals in Galway and Wexford. Performances by the Silesian University choir from Gliwice, Poland and the National Chamber Choir acknowledge the great choral traditions of Eastern Europe.

The festival also presents Ireland's major celebration of the centenary of Olivier Messiaen's birth, performing all of his organ works as well as some of his choral and orchestral music. In short, a wonderful array of concerts, recitals, and masterclasses in the country's finest churches, cathedrals and concert halls.



MAY BANK HOLIDAY WEEKEND 2008

Twenty eight bleary-eyed Ulster organists met at Aldergrove early on the morning of

Saturday 3rd May for check-in for Manchester, our first port-of-call on the three day trip to Manchester, Chester, Liverpool and environs. After a speedy check-in (unlike the hundreds in the Easyiet queue), we were given a booklet about our forthcoming tour. This sumptuous 32 booklet had page meticulously prepared by Stephen Hamill, and contained photographs, specifications, programmes, maps, service music and all information necessary for our visit.



Our first visit was to St. Anne's church, Manchester, where the veteran organist, Ronald Frost, gave a short demonstration of the instrument, which included C. S. Lang's Tuba Tune. Afterwards some members availed of the opportunity to play the instrument, while others partook of morning coffee, although none of us could understand why the adjacent toilet was closed 'for health and safety reasons!'



We then travelled to Preston for a visit to two very different instruments – a virtually untouched 1865 Father Willis and a 1989 David Wells. Although the Willis organ is in need of substantial work, his tonal genius shone through the heavy action, unsteady wind and archaic console. I was particularly impressed with the brightness and clarity of the ensemble – this instrument certainly dispels the myth of any pre-conceptions of Victorian organs as being dull and uninspiring. Lyndon Hills demonstrated both organs, and his polished rendition of a Brahms Intermezzo on the grand piano was an added bonus. Sadly, both of these beautiful churches, with their fine organs, have no

regular choir to lead the worship.

The highlight of Saturday was undoubtedly the Walker organ in Blackburn Cathedral. In the absence of the assistant organist, the technical features of the instrument were explained by Canon Andrew Hindley, while Stephen Hamill gave an impromptu recital which included several improvisations and Bach's Prelude in G major. Music in Blackburn cathedral is obviously very strong – the organ is well maintained, there are 170 singers in five voluntary choirs involved

in worship on a regular basis, and the clergy and community are proud of their rich tradition. In an age when the future of traditional church music is in decline in



many establishments, the Blackburn approach to music in worship is innovative and could serve as a model for others to follow.

We then travelled to our hotel in Chester and dined together in Chez Jules restaurant. On Sunday morning most of the party attended Sung Eucharist in the cathedral, sung by the girls and lay clerks of the cathedral choir. This was an impressive service and concluded with

Alain's Litanies. We then headed to St. Asaph and lunch, followed by a short organ recital by the cathedral Director of Music, Alan Maginess, on the 1998 four manual Wood instrument. We then proceeded to the home of Roger Fisher in Trelogan, a

short distance from St. Asaph. Roger demonstrated his own three manual house organ, while his wife served a delicious Roger's recital included afternoon tea. Mendelssohn's first Organ Sonata in Fminor.

Monday 5th May was Liverpool Organ Day – we made our way to the Anglican cathedral for the 11.15 a.m. Bank Holiday Organ Recital, which was given by Daniel Bishop on the five manual mobile nave console. After the recital there was time to explore this vast

building - the Lady Chapel was a particular gem, complete with its own two manual Willis instrument. After lunch we proceeded to Liverpool Metropolitan cathedral. where we were given a behind the scenes' tour of the Lutvens crypt by Terry Duffy, former Director of Music at the cathedral. The crypt, which was the only part of Lutyens' plans which materialised, was constructed on an enormous scale. Had his full design been executed, the Metropolitan cathedral would have dwarfed the Anglican one! Tim Noon, the Director of Music, gave our second recital of the day. Unfortunately we had to leave slightly early to travel to Manchester Airport, but I understand that in our absence Tim's encore consisted of extracts from Riverdance!
