

John Rutter is one of the heroes of twentieth century British classical music.

Choirs up and down the land would be impoverished without his work, and Christmas somehow wouldn't be the same without some of his carols lilting in the frosty air!

Most of his works are crowd pleasers, and he generally provides worthwhile parts for all the voices (which is particularly appreciated by altos, who often end up singing the same two or three notes throughout a piece!). There is a tendency for more serious critics to look down their noses at Rutter's work, but this is unfair: it is, for the most part, pleasant to listen to and within the grasp of any decent church choir or choral society. It may not be as fashionably minimalist as some of today's composers, but it is good music - good to perform and good to listen to.

John Rutter was born in London on 24th September, 1945 and received his first musical education as a chorister at Highgate School, where a fellow pupil was John Tavener. He went on to study music at Clare College, Cambridge, where he wrote his first published compositions and conducted his first recording while still a student.

His compositional career has embraced both large and small-scale choral works, orchestral and instrumental pieces, a piano concerto, two children's operas, music for television, and specialist writing for such groups as the Philip Jones Brass Ensemble and the King's Singers.

His larger choral works, Gloria (1974), Requiem (1985), Magnificat (1990), Psalmfest (1993) and Mass of the Children (2003) have been performed many times in Britain, North America, and a growing number of other countries. He co-edited four volumes in the extraordinarily successful Carols for Choirs series with Sir David Willcocks, and, more recently, has edited the first two volumes in the new Oxford Choral Classics series, Opera Choruses (1995) and European Sacred Music (1996).

From 1975 to 1979 he was Director of Music at Clare College, whose choir he directed in a number of broadcasts and recordings. After giving up the Clare post to allow more time for composition, in 1981 he formed his own choir, the Cambridge Singers, as a professional chamber choir primarily dedicated to recording sacred choral repertoire, and he now divides his time between composition and conducting. He still lives near Cambridge, but frequently conducts other choirs and orchestras around the world. He has guest-conducted or lectured at many concert halls, universities, churches, music festivals, and conferences in Europe, Africa, North and Central America and Australasia.

In 1980 he was made an honorary Fellow of Westminster Choir College, Princeton, and in 1988 a Fellow of the Guild of Church Musicians. In 1996 the Archbishop of Canterbury conferred a Lambeth Doctorate of Music upon him in recognition of his contribution to church music. He was honoured in the 2007 Queen's New Year Honours List, when he was awarded a CBE for services to music.

Rutter's compositions are chiefly choral, and include Christmas carols, anthems and extended works such as a Gloria, a Magnificat, and a Requiem. The world premiere of his Requiem Mass, as well as his authoritative version of Faure's, was with the Fox Valley Festival Chorus, in Illinois, during his tenure with Cambridge. In 2002 his setting of Psalm 150, commissioned for the Queen's Golden Jubilee, was performed at the thanksgiving service in St Paul's Cathedral, London. He has also written an opera for young people called Bang!

Rutter's music is eclectic, showing the influences of the French and English choral traditions of the early 20th century, as well as of light music and American classic songwriting. Almost every choral anthem and hymn that he writes, in addition to the standard piano/organ accompaniment, has a subsequent orchestral accompaniment as well, utilizing various different instrumentations, such as strings only, strings and woodwinds, or full orchestra with brass and percussion, among others.

Despite composing and conducting much religious music, Rutter told the U.S. television program 60 Minutes in 2003 that he was not particularly a religious man, but he is inspired by the spirituality of sacred verses and prayers. The 60 Minutes program, which aired a week before Christmas, focused on Rutter's popularity with choral groups in the U.S.A., Britain and other parts of the world, and on his composition, Mass of the Children, composed after the sudden and tragic death of his son Christopher, a student.

His music is very popular, particularly in the U.S.A. (NBC's Today Show called him "the world's greatest living composer and conductor of choral music"); though in the UK it receives a more mixed reception. Some from the Anglican choral tradition do not regard him as a sufficiently 'serious' composer. There is still great appreciation for his work in many parts of the UK, however, as illustrated by the following quotation from a review in the London 'Evening Standard' (25th September, 2005): "For the infectiousness of his melodic invention and consummate craftsmanship, Rutter has few peers."

In terms of performances John Rutter is probably the most successful choral composer of his generation. For example, his Shepherd's Pipe Carol, written while he was still at school, is reputed to have sold well over one million copies in sheet music alone!

John Rutter's music is published by Oxford University Press, Hinshaw Music Inc. and Collegium Music Publications.

# NEW SERVICE available through the B.E.L.B. MUSIC LIBRARY

Last year this library set up The Choral Collection which includes additional titles and multiple copies of vocal scores. This improved service means that the music library can now provide copies of many well known and loved scores from stock rather than sourcing from other libraries.

### ULSTER IN PETERBOROUGH

Two USOC members, Philip Kennedy and John Crothers, were in the ranks of 'The Balligan Consort' which sang daily services in Peterborough Cathedral from Wednesday 13th – Sunday 17th August inclusive. Directed by David McKnight, the Consort's wide and varied repertoire included:

- Preces/Responses by Barnard, Neary, Radcliffe, Reading, Sanders (First Set) [RSCM] and Sanders (Second Set) [Oecumuse].
- ☐ Evening Canticles Charles Wood in E minor, Gibbons 'Short Service', June Nixon (Second Service) [Encore], S. S. Wesley in F and Thomas Caustun.
- Morning Canticles William Boyce in C.
- ☐ Eucharist Office 'Missa Brevis' (Radcliffe).
- ☐ Introits 'Ave Maria' (Victoria), 'Glory to Thee' (Whitbourn), 'I know my soul hath power' (Parry), 'O Lord support us' (Henrietta Byrne Moran) and 'Peace be to this congregation' (Cadden/Grindle).
- Anthems 'Ave maris stella' (Daley), 'Geistliches Lied' (Brahms), 'O salutaris hostia' (Rossini), 'Sicut cervus' (Palestrina), 'The Creation' (McDougall) and 'Tu es Petrus' (Hassler).

With the exception of the Brahms, music, including Psalms, was unaccompanied. It was impressive and moving to hear these excellent ambassadors from Ulster sing in this ancient cathedral. With an unmatched clarity of tone, subtle interpretation of music and of words, and excellence of musicianship, 'The Balligan Consort' exported to England a tradition of which we can all be proud for, unlike the plethora of concert choirs, whose existence has contributed to empty places in choir stalls throughout churches in the North of Ireland, The Balligan Consort's raison d'être is to sing regular liturgical services.

It does this in St Andrew's Church, Balligan, Ballywalter Parish, Co Down, on the 2nd and 4th Sundays of the months September – June, when it sings Choral Evensong at 3.30 pm. An annual Advent Carol Service and 'The Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols' at 8pm on Christmas Eve complete its duties.

At Balligan Church there is the opportunity to share in a tradition of worship which can be traced back to the days of a Benedictine monastery known as 'Black Abbey' sited about a mile southwest of Ballywalter. In 1704,

early in the reign of Queen Anne, the historic Church of St Andrew, Balligan, united three parishes connected to the Black Abbey and it recently underwent major restoration during its tercentennial year.

It is an holy and atmospheric place, lit only by candles and oil lamps, where much of the service is sung by the Consort alone, during which the congregation worships in silent participation. You are encouraged to attend services in St Andrew's Church, Balligan, where you will be made welcome and you will not be disappointed.











#### WELL DONE!

Congratulations to USOC member Edward Craig and his choir Grosvenor for their success in securing a place in the Category Finals of BBC Radio 3 (Adult) Choir of the Year Competition.

The National Selection Stage took place on 18th June 2008. All of the choirs who got through each Area Selection Stage were judged against one another for a place at the Category Finals. These will take place at the Philharmonic Hall, Liverpool on Saturday 8th and Sunday 9th November as part of the Liverpool European Capital of Culture '08 celebrations.

The Grand Final will take place at the newly refurbished Royal Festival Hall, on London's South Bank, on Sunday 7th December and will be broadcast on BBC4 and BBC Radio 3.



# PROPOSED USOC 2009 MAY TRIP

# Friday 1st ~ Bank Holiday Monday 4th May

Partly as a result of feedback from members, we have been working on the possibility of visiting some areas associated with J.S. Bach. These being in the eastern part of Germany, and direct flights to Berlin not being at convenient times, we propose to travel from Belfast International to and from Prague, provided the 2009 Easyjet timetable is similar to this year's.

If what we have been working on is able to be finalised the details will be as follows:

FRIDAY 1ST 16:40 Easyjet from Belfast International to Prague: arrive 20:10 Coach to Hotel Ibis in Dresden city centre; arrive c22:30

SATURDAY 2ND Day in Leipzig, visiting Altenburg Castle on the way (Trost organ in Chapel). In Leipzig, visit the Bach Archiv and Museum and attend public concerts in the famous St Thomas' (Bach's church) and

St .Nicholas' Churches. Some free time.

SUNDAY 3RD Divided between Dresden and Freiberg (45 minutes away). This is

Silbermann country' and we are planning to visit churches and cathedrals, mostly with organs by this famous builder. Also on our itinerary will be the Frauenkirche, the magnificent church in Dresden, rebuilt in the original style following war damage and

opened amid much publicity in 2005.

MONDAY 4TH The plan at present is to leave our hotel after breakfast in a coach

for Prague, where we would visit three magnificent churches and also have free time. However, we might spend more time in Germany if we are unable to gain access to all the desired churches

in Prague.

20:40 Flight to Belfast: arrive 22:15

We need to gauge the level of interest in such a trip and have deposits so that we can book flights as soon as they become available.

The cost is likely to be around £380 if sharing a double or twin room and £450 for single occupancy.


This would cover return flights, coach travel, three nights on a bed and breakfast basis and all fees, concert tickets etc.-but NOT other meals.


















# 'THE ILLUSIONIST'S ART'

Ian Mills reports on a summer of organ music at Derry Cathedral, including a silent movie improvisation by David Briggs.

If, like me, you spend half an hour on a Sunday afternoon in the company of the Times' restaurant critics, you will appreciate that only a very small proportion of what A. A. Gill and the insufferable Michael Winner have to say is in any way related to what they may have chewed and swallowed in the past week. On Sunday 20th July, an audience at Derry



Cathedral was treated to a two course masterclass in the art of improvisation by the British virtuoso, David Briggs. Given that I possess neither the literary prowess of Messrs. Gill or Winner, the following review of Briggs' concert may seem a little out of proportion. But bear with me. At any rate, I hope these short observations bring you up to date with the musical goings-on in the North West.

Each year, St Columb's Cathedral - Derry's most historic building - welcomes over 80,000 visitors. These numbers are constantly changing, but, according to the latest statistics released by the Northern Ireland Tourist Board, Derry Cathedral is the province's second most popular attraction (after the Giant's Causeway). The Cathedral's 2008 Summer Music Festival - a new venture - was designed with two aims in mind: firstly, to celebrate the 375th anniversary of the Cathedral's completion and secondly, to allow our new 59 rank Wells-Kennedy organ to find a new audience. Each of our three lunchtime concerts was exceptionally well attended: audience numbers at each recital reached triple-figures. Performers included Travis Baker (Australia), the renowned UK-based counter-tenor Mark Chambers, and the choir of Christ's College, Cambridge. The culmination of the Festival was a celebrity recital and silent movie improvisation by David Briggs.



The main course was to be an improvisation accompaniment of the 1923 film The Hunchback of Notre Dame. David confessed that he was more than a little familiar with this movie, given that this was his to be his 32nd performance! Before the movie began, we heard a series of aperitifs, including

Briggs' new arrangement of Glinka's overture to Ruslan and Ludmilla (an arrangement which had been premièred at the Royal Albert Hall a few weeks before), along with popular works by Mendelssohn, Elgar and Scott Joplin. The 25 minute first half concluded with an

improvisation on the Battle Hymn of the Republic, complete with a 2-part (and sometimes 3-part) fugue for the feet.

As David explained, the art of organ improvisation is enjoying a renaissance - not least thanks to his own efforts. A quick look at Briggs' website reveals the extent of the genre's international appeal; indeed, a few days after David left Derry, he performed the same Hunchback improvisation in Cologne Cathedral to an audience of 4000. Briggs reiterates advice from his idol Pierre Cochereau, explaining that improvisation is essentially the original 'illusionist's art'.



An improvisation on this scale (the movie lasts almost 2 hours) can be approached, and enjoyed on many levels. Children will be mesmerized by the high sounds and low sounds, the loud noises and the gentle stops; composers and the analytically minded can appreciate the complex leitmotifs and structure: the rest of us can fall somewhere in between.

Having never heard a silent movie improvisation before, I was struck by the connection between the action on-screen, and the response from the player at the console. It was immediate, and at times even pre-emptive, but never distracting. Also, I was incredibly impressed by Briggs' use of

dynamics to portray action in both foreground and background. For example, a close-up scene showing the great bells of Notre Dame would be accompanied with the immediacy of the Great reeds; but when the camera moved away from the bell tower, the same theme could be heard, but on the Swell with the box closed. This clever subtlety lent the performance a sense of dimension and perspective.



Silent movie accompaniment must surely be one of the most physically and mentally draining art-forms. Although Briggs draws on pastiche by various composers - we heard bits and pieces by Vierne, Tchaikovsky and Rachmaninov, to name but a few - the way in which each theme is knit together is incredibly impressive.

Briggs' use of the instrument is always fresh and inspiring, and there are moments in the movie which lend themselves to improvisation: the epic scene when Quasimodo pours molten lead from the west face of Notre Dame is just one example. Throughout this thoroughly enjoyable performance, the Solo strings were used to great effect, and I particularly enjoyed hearing the Swell reeds used in the style of French *en chamades*, accompanied by rich 8' and 4' *fonds* from other departments. Notre Dame indeed!



In 2004, she was appointed organ scholar at Southwell Minster, working under Paul Hale, during which time she was awarded Associateship of the Royal College of Organists. She was also accompanist and associate conductor for the Cranmer Company of Singers, a Nottinghamshire based chamber choir. She has completed the MMus course at the Royal College of Music, where she studied organ with David Graham and harpsichord with Robert Woolley. In recent years Emma has been organ scholar at Brentwood Cathedral, associate organist at St. Sepulchre-without-Newgate and Director of Music at St. Mary's Church, Stoke D'Abernon, in Surrey.
